## Message from President of Ringette Saskatchewan

As a parent I enjoy watching my girls grow and develop as they play ringette. I am an advocate for the sport and the amazing work done by the Associations to provide our players the opportunity to play and compete. This year brought about an unexpected change in my personal level of involvement with the organizations that have become such a significant part of my family's lives.

I was given the opportunity to participate in shaping the direction of ringette when I was appointed to the Ringette Association of Saskatchewan (RAS) Board of Directors last fall. Over the last year, I have become familiar with the Strategic Plan for RAS and started participating in the development of action plans and policy changes to supporting our strategic plans.

This past year RAS and our member associations have been striving to elevate the level of sportsmanship and respect. Policies to provide more support for our officials have been put into place and a Parent Code of Conduct was developed to outline expectations of our parents. This coming year will see more initiatives aimed at making this environment the best possible for our athletes, coaches and officials to support them as they work towards their development goals.

Player development is the cornerstone to the success of our programs, our athletes and their future in this sport. RAS will be working with associations to support their programs as they move towards implementing (or continuing to implement) the development recommendations that came out of Ringette Canada's Competition Review using the LTAD framework. We will encourage and support associations and coaches by providing them with the skills, tools and information to run these programs consistently and effectively to ensure each player has access to appropriate development pathways based on their chosen personal excellence pathway.

Admittedly, my knowledge in a lot of these areas is limited as I haven't been involved as a player, coach or major official. I will be relying heavily on our RAS Board, RAS staff, member associations and ringette community to leverage their knowledge and experience. I plan to actively solicit information and I welcome discussion and debate from participants at all levels and from all roles.

And lastly, thank you all for your involvement in the sport. It takes a village, and I'm continually awed by people's willingness to get involved and your unselfish commitment to this sport. I truly look forward to working with you all to continue to grow and elevate ringette in the Province of Saskatchewan as well as on the national stage.



# Message from Executive Director

This past year marked a milestone as we entered the halfway point of our Strategic Plan. Our organization took this as an opportunity to review the progress that has been made while identifying new opportunities for success in each one of our six strategic priorities.

Within our strategic priority Athlete Development, we feel we do a successful job with supporting our Associations with Come Try Ringette, which is the essential program in our province that helps attract new members to our sport; this year we had the highest conversation rate compared to any other province in Canada. Gym Ringette is another action item within this area that we feel we are victorious in. We use Gym Ringette as an avenue to grow partnerships, create more awareness, while also introducing younger participants to our sport which in turn we hope attracts them to registering with our Associations. Within the next year, we will be consulting with our Associations on how we collectively can follow Ringette Canada's mandate that "all players in U9 should be playing the game that does not exceed half the ice surface by the 2020-21 season." RAS strongly encourages this mandate as we feel it will help develop athletes who are able to execute the skills applicable to their developmental status.



In the strategic priority Coaching Development, we can see the progress that is continuously being made. We recognize with the help of our Learning Facilitators, who facilitate clinics, our coaches can receive the tools necessary to feel competent and confident in leading our athletes in the pursuit of their success. Our Associations contribute significantly to this priority area, particularly, our Association's Coach Developers as they assist us in making sure all coaches are meeting Ringette Canada's Coaching Certification requirements. It is the priority of our organization to move ahead with adding more resources to our website to help our coaches gain more knowledge as they continue on their coaching pathway.

Official Development is a strategic priority that we all need to focus on within the next couple of years, because in order to maximize participation in our sport, quality officials will be needed. This year surveys were sent out to our officials to help us in attain more knowledge on how we can recruit, develop, advance, and retain them at all levels; our future action items are based on the knowledge we learned. The big action item we will be undertaking will be prioritizing that all officials are treated respectfully so we can eliminate the abuse of officials which in turn will assist us in retention. Another action item in this area we will be conducting is working with our Associations leading up to their AA tournaments to ensure officials in our province are receiving evaluations so they can advance and develop along the official's pathway.

High Performance Programming over the past couples of years was primarily focused on our Canada Winter Games team. We had targeted 52 athletes, countless coaches evaluating our athletes, and getting 2 of the 3 coaching staff Competition Development certified. Now that we have completed the Canada Winter Games program, we will be focusing on evaluating previous standards from the past program and finding new ways we can improve; the first step in this was sending out countless surveys to our members regarding the 2019 program. We are ready to make high performance a priority that supports the Pursuit of Excellence off all athletes, coaches, and officials.

Marketing and Promotion, we have made a lot of headway in these past couple years. Currently we use three social networking sites, website is constantly being updated with new information, and we're creating creative and innovative ways to attract media awareness and attention. One thing we will be working on in the next year is a Sponsorship Consortium with Ringette Canada and other Provincial Ringette organizations with the aim of pooling together assets to create a common goal of generating more revenue.

Organizational Excellence is being achieved in many of our strategic actions. Staff have formalized ways to report to Directors, workplans align with strategic priorities, and individual roles, responsibilities, and policies have been created to allow us to contribute to the advancement of ringette in Saskatchewan. We are however, always evaluating what is currently done against the changing landscape of sport and finding new ways to plan for a future state. We're always listening to our members and our Associations, so their needs are met, so together we can continue to foster a positive sport experience for all.

As we're moving into the last year of our strategic plan, we can confidently state that we have demonstrated progress in all six of our strategic priorities. Although we understand there is much more work yet to be done, we are proud of the successes we have achieved and proud of the support from our Associations, Members, and Stakeholders.

# ORGANIZATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

## Athletes

- 211 athletes participated in A/AA Provincial Championships held in Saskatoon
- 320 athletes participated in B Provincial Championships held in Regina
- 9 Come Try Ringette events were held with 165 participants attending. Had a conversation rate of 64% that registered for the 2018-19 season
- 2018 summer our Summer Student attended 51 programs in the province with the total amount of participants targeted being 1089

## Officials

- Held a meeting November 5 with key officials in our sport to collaborate and exchange information on our officials currently state of affairs
- Sent out survey to officials that have exit our sport in the past several years to gain some insight and feedback into why they have left
- 21 officials received training in 2 Level 1 clinics
- 10 officials received training in 1 Level 2/3 clinics
- 32 officials were evaluated in Level 1
- 12 officials were evaluated in Level 2
- 6 officials were evaluated in Level 3

Natalie Muller Ringette Canada's Technical Director attended as well as David Myers Ringette Alberta's Executive Director
- 70 coaches received training in 4 CSI clinics
- 47 coaches received training in 3 CI clinics
- 16 coaches received evaluations and became CI certified
- Certified a new Learning Facilitator in Saskatoon to facilitate clinics

## High Performance

- 1 official (Aaron Armstrong) was selected to attend the Canadian Ringette Championship as an on-ice official
- 1 individual (Brenda King) was selected to attend the Canadian Ringette Championship as a shot clock operator
- July 2018, 7 athletes attended Ringette Canada's La Releve U17 High Performance Camp
- 18 athletes, 3 coaches, 1 Women in Apprentice Coach attended Canada Winter Games in Red Deer, Albert
- Surveys were sent out to Canada Winter Games (CWG) athletes, coaches, parents, AA athletes, parents, and coaches to gain feedback and insight into the CWG program to make improvements for next cycle
- Entry fees were paid for each of our A and AA Team Saskatchewan Provincial representatives that attended Western Canadian Ringette Championship as well as the Canadian Ringette Championships
- Extra funding was also awarded to the A and AA teams that attended Western Canadian Ringette Championship as well as the Canadian Ringette Championships
- Funding was also allocated to A and AA teams who used RAS High Performance Program which partners with Sport Medicine and Science Council

## Marketing Promotion

- Signed a Sponsorship Consortium Agreement with Ringette Canada and many of the Ringette Provincial Organizations with the aim to pool together inventory of assets with the common goal of getting sponsorship revenue
- November 5, 2018 Ringette Saskatchewan implemented another social media networking site called Instagram.
- We started using google analytics for our website so we can track where our members are clicking, when, how often, and from what device.
- We implemented HootSuite which is a Social Media and Marketing Management Dashboard. It helps us manage and track our social network channels. It allows us to also follow our local associations, our fellow Provincial ringette organizations, and our sport partners social media channels so we're constantly alerted when they are posting and if they're engaging Ringette Saskatchewan
- We moved our Facebook social media network to a business page which now gives us the capability to see page insights, post reach, post engagement, and new page likes
- We held a 12 days of Christmas Giveaways on our Facebook page. Where every day people had to like our page, answer a Ringette Saskatchewan question in order to win some Ringette Saskatchewan swag. We saw our page likes increase as well as engagement increased and along the way individuals learned more about Ringette Saskatchewan
- We designed Ringette Saskatchewan Instagram frames where we used at Provincials and are using this summer at programs for participants to take photos with
- We designed Provincial Championship snapchat filters that we used as our events
- We're using Canva to design posters to post on our social networking sites

## Regina Ringette

Our board members spent a great deal of time this past year cleaning up our League Playing Rules and making them more clear/concise. Based on recommendations from Ringette Saskatchewan we also created and implemented new Policies such as a Social Media Policy, Discipline and Complaints Policy, Trans inclusion Policy and a Conflict of Interest Policy. We also updated and posted other policies that already existed. All are now easily accessible on our website under the Rules and Policies page. This was a huge undertaking and I would like to thank the board members who spent many hours working on this project.

Regina Ringette Association created a new Lifetime Achievement Award this past year. This award will honor a Regina Ringette member for exceptional leadership, service and a passion for Ringette excellence. Through their actions and contributions, the nominee has helped make Regina Ringette the outstanding Association that it is. More importantly, the contributions have been above and beyond the everyday and have had a long-lasting positive influence on Regina Ringette. It is our way of saying thank you for the valuable legacy which our membership can continue to build upon. All members, past and present, are eligible.

A committee of current board members began discussions on selection for the first recipient and a decision was made that the most appropriate recipients for the first year of the award, were four of the men who were responsible for starting ringette in Regina and spent many years to help ensure its longevity. The award recipients were Bob Gotts, Al Heron, Jim Benning and Hal Kathol. The awards were presented at our end of the season Coach/Volunteer Appreciation Celebration. Families of all four men were in attendance. Mr. Heron and Mr. Benning were present to accept the awards. Mr. Gotts and Mr. Kathol were honored posthumously and the awards were accepted by each of their daughters.

It was a tremendous honor to present these awards and I look forward to this becoming a tradition within our league.

The goalie clinics that RRA provided continue to be well attended. Once again, the program was offered once a week for the entire season this year. It is our intention to continue with this initiative.

For the second year, RRA hosted a tournament in November for the A and AA teams in U16 and U19. The tournament was very successful – hosting 16 teams (exceeding our goal of 15 teams). The U16AA division had 2 teams from each province (SK, AB, MB); The U19A Division had 2 teams from SK and AB, and one team from MB; The U19AA division had 1 team from SK and MB and 3 teams from AB. SaskTel Max came out to record two of the final games, which gives great exposure to our sport. The weekend was very successful and many teams have already expressed interest in returning this year. We have also added an Open A division to the tournament as there appears to be interest at that level.

The other annual tournaments hosted by RRA were also successful. The Jim Benning tournament in January had a total of 41 teams. Twenty-seven of these teams were from out of town.

The Queen City Classic at the beginning of February hosted a total of 39 teams, 12 of which were from out of town. We look forward to continued success for these long running annual tournaments.

Once again, RRA presented Coaching awards for the coaches in our league. The “Coaches of the Year” were selected based on feedback throughout the season and nominations that were received from the players/families.

# RAS Associations Presidents Reports

## Saskatoon Ringette

### Past President – Kim Brown

The Saskatoon Ringette Association (SRA) had a successful 2018-19 season. Player registration reached an all-time high with 518 players, marking the first time that SRA cracked the 500 player threshold. SRA achieved a net gain of 31 players with an overall retention rate of 85%. The recruitment rate remains highest in LTP, U8 and U10 with 84% of all new players registering in these divisions. The largest divisions were 18+ with 137 players and U10 with 96 players.

The SRA Board kicked off the year with a board orientation and strategic planning session last May. Through this exercise, the Board identified key areas of focus – Athlete Development, Coach Development, Organizational Excellence and Marketing – with the aim of achieving SRA’s long-term objectives to recruit, develop and retain players. Many of the various initiatives and specific work aimed supporting the key areas of focus are presented in subsequent reports in this package.

Building on the work of the 2017-18 policy review, SRA once again enlisted the help of McDougall Gauley LLP to help the board undertake a governance review. This review examined the board structure, how the board completes the work, and what improvements could help the board work more effectively and efficiently, and serve the membership better. Members were invited to attend and provide feedback at an information session where an initial draft of a revised board structure was presented and discussed. The final proposal for a revised board structure which includes reducing the number of board positions to 12 from 16, and supported by a series of committees, will be presented to the membership at the 2019 AGM. To complement a revised board structure and to better inform volunteers about the roles and responsibilities of specific board positions, terms of reference for the proposed committees and board positions were also developed. These changes were approved at SRA’s AGM.

I would like to express my gratitude to all the board members for their time and energy in supporting all the work of SRA, including our Commissioners (Lori Flamand – U8, Danielle Hepp – U10, Carmen Hesje – U12, Jenny Degagne – U14, Rochelle Penman – U16/U19 and Amy Pederson – 18+), Tournaments (Aaron Norum and Julie Mutch), Fundraising (Wade Obst), Equipment (Rachelle Zentner), Marketing and Communications (Michelle Correia and Gary Banerd), VP of Discipline (Craig Hinz), VP of Coaching (Rachelle Zapisocki) and VP of Athlete Development (Mel Brockman). Thank you to Brenda King for her hard work and support in the office. Finally, thank you to all the coaches, managers, trainers, referees, parents, volunteers and, of course, the players for your passion and dedication to our sport!

# RAS Associations Presidents Reports

## Buffalo Plains Ringette Association

### President - Amanda Dauk

The 2018/19 ringette season was a great one for the Buffalo Plains Ringette Association.

Membership was provided with the capability to pay for their registration online, a function that was previously not available prior to this season. Registration numbers were up slightly, with a bit of a drop off in the lower age divisions. We had 17 teams registered from U8 to Open, four of which included junior coaches, and 10 of which had a female head coach. BPRA was very happy with these numbers and will continue to encourage and support female head coaches and junior coaches, to help grow the sport.

BPRA was able to provide a total of 700 ice times to our teams, plus additional dryland sessions at one of our local schools. The Board arranged for a goalie coach to attend 26 practices throughout the year, in various age divisions, to provide goalies with an experienced learning and development opportunity. This additional coaching is very well received by our coaches, parents and players, and we will continue to provide this extra support to the BPRA goalies.

The Association continued with our fall skills camps and spring 3x3 sessions. Due to an increase in registration in our younger age groups, some divisions played 4x4 instead, which wasn't well received by all parents. Due to this response from our membership, we may look at capping registration numbers next season to ensure we maintain a 3x3 program.

The annual December Charge-Lou Gillespie Memorial Tournament, held on November 29-December 2, 2018, included 54 teams. This was a decrease of 2 teams from the year prior; however, the tournament was still an outstanding success. Profits from the tournament paid for new shot clocks in all three of our rinks: Pilot Butte, White City and Balgonie, which we hope will make for a better experience for all teams who play in our arenas.

Three BPRA officials received their Level 2 designation this past season, which is a great development for our association. We appreciate the many ringette officials within our association, Regina and across the country, and will be promoting positive parent support as well positivity in the rink and among our players in the coming season.

The Board implemented a Constitution in June 2019, and we continue to work on developing and approving policies which will assist in guiding the Board in the upcoming ringette seasons. As a next step, BPRA is looking into becoming an incorporated entity, as it will provide further clarity and transparency for the Board and its members.

Overall, the BPRA membership had a great 2018/19 season, and we look forward to another great one in the year ahead.
