They snagged Gold on the consolation side at the University Challenge Cup! Way to go, team! The University of Saskatchewan is following suit, expanding even more opportunities for our athletes.

This season, we also rolled out our new strategic plan for the next four years. This comprehensive plan is a significant achievement and sets a clear vision for the future growth and success of ringette in Saskatchewan. It will guide us in our efforts to enhance the sport, support our athletes, and strengthen our community.

Saskatchewan had an amazing presence at the Western Canadian Ringette Championships (WCRC's), showcasing topnotch skills and sportsmanship, and our U19A and 18+A Team Sask. brought home silver medals! We're also extremely proud of our athletes who received invitations to the Ringette Canada National Programs. Organizational Highlights

Athletes

- O 19 Come Try Ringette Events were held in 5 communities throughout the season, with 298 registered participants.
- Children's Ringette continued to be implemented at the Fundamentals 1, 2, and 3 levels. There were 313 athletes and 28 teams registered in Children's Ringette throughout the province.
- O 3 Saskatchewan athletes were invited to Ringette Canada's Senior National Team Camp Madison Ryan (Saskatchewan Heat), Jenna Carter (Saskatchewan Heat), and Holly Kozan (Saskatchewan Heat).
- 2 Saskatchewan athletes were invited to Ringette Canada's Junior National Team Camps Taylor Johnston (RRA) and Brianna Shupe (RRA).
- 1 Saskatchewan athlete was invited to Ringette Canada's U18 International Development Program Ingrid Heerspink (RRA).
- 5 Saskatchewan athletes were invited to Ringette Canada's U17 La Releve event Natalie Seymour (RRA), London Clemett (RRA), Brigette Parks (RRA), Adria Thorson (RRA), and Scotia Waters (SRA).
- Ringette Saskatchewan and the Sport Medicine and Science Council of Saskatchewan Partnership distributed \$4,500 in High Performance Assistance Grants and sport medicine and science sessions.
- A/AA, B, and 18+ Provincial Championships took place in February and March 2024 in the communities of Saskatoon and Regina. A total of 642 athletes competed in 96 games over the two weekends.

Coaches

- 9 41 coaches attended 3 CSI clinics throughout the province.
- O 12 coaches attended 3 CI clinics throughout the province.
- 13 coaches received CI evaluations to become CI-Certified.
- 1 Saskatchewan coach was invited to Ringette Canada's Junior National Team Camps – Donnell Schoenhofen (RRA).
- 2 Saskatchewan coaches were invited to Ringette Canada's U18 International Development Program Daina Seymour (RRA) and Holly Kozan (BPRA).
- A/AA, B, and 18+ Provincial Championships took place in February and March 2024 in the communities of Saskatoon and Regina. A total of 131 coaches and team staff participated in 96 games over the two weekends.

Officials

- O Total of 80 active officials throughout the province this season.
- O 54 officials attended clinics throughout the province.
- **O** 74 official evaluations were completed this season.
- A/AA, B, and 18+ Provincial Championships took place in February and March 2024 in the communities of Saskatoon and Regina. A total of 30 officials participated in 96 games over the two weekends.
- O Blair MacGregor (SRA, supervisor) was selected to attend the 2024 Western Canadian Ringette Championships.
- O Blair MacGregor (SRA, supervisor), Aaron Armstrong (SRA, on-ice official), and Darrin Kruger (SRA, shot clock operator) were selected to attend the 2024 Canadian Ringette Championships.

Organizational Excellence

- Allocated \$49,400 from Sask Sport's Member Assistance Program Grant to local associations.
- Continued using the registration database RAMP under Ringette Canada.
- Continued collaboration with the Saskatchewan Heat regarding financials and team management.

Coaches and Officials Development

- Develop a program dedicated to the ongoing recruitment and training of coaches at all levels which will provide potential coaches with the necessary skills, knowledge, and resources to succeed in their roles.
- O Support training one to two new Coach Learning Facilitators
- Create opportunities for members to connect, collaborate, and to share information and resources.

Officials

- Develop a comprehensive plan that focuses on the active recruitment, retention, and support of officials including strategies for attracting new talent, retaining existing members, and providing ongoing support to ensure their success.
- O Continue the Green Armband Initiative providing armbands to all officials under the age of 18; emphasizing that these are young individuals officiating games.
- O Continue to support High-Performance officials attending Western Canadian Ringette Championships, Canadian Ringette Championships, and elite tournaments including the National Ringette League
- Create opportunities for members to connect, collaborate, and to share information and resources.

Growing Ringette

- Create a working sub-committee to oversee ongoing opportunities for programming and services for the membership with a focus on growth.
- Continue supporting associations in the hosting of Come Try Ringette events.
- Maintain our dedication to providing Gym Ringette programs in partnership with local associations and community organizations.
- Continue to leverage social media to enhance widespread awareness of the sport of Ringette.
- Continue to recognize excellence and remarkable achievements through awards and recognition programs.

Their dedication, perseverance, and teamwork will represent the values that lie within our organization, and we have every confidence in their ability to represent us with pride and distinction on this larger stage.

SRA has continued to work with the Teamlinkt programming tools, which has seemed to be operating quite well with our communication and scheduling needs. There is discussion about looking into online game sheets for next season in conjunction with Ringette Saskatchewan and the other provincial associations.

Over the previous summer the board worked together to design, develop, and was very excited to debut an updated look and logo. We created an online storefront for items ready to be purchased with the new SRA logo which will be open and available year- round. This new look is on the jerseys that were provided to the fundamental teams this season and there are plans to purchase updated jerseys as needed for the remaining divisions in the 2024-25 season. Stay tuned for more information on all that is to come with the redesign!

Registration numbers showed a slight decrease to 507 for 2023-24, down from 525 for the 2022-23 season. SRA does remain focused on our objective to work hard by encouraging the retention of our existing athletes and families, while welcoming and introducing our sport to new members. Feedback from the membership is always used in our planning, as well as many "Come Try Ringette" events in Saskatoon and surrounding areas are booked to take place over the summer and into the fall.

THANK YOU, for your countless hours of hard work and dedication spent around the office supporting our members! To the board members and their committees, thank you for all that you do in volunteering and giving of your time and energy throughout the season.
